CHARACTERISTICS

- An <u>authentic</u>, deliberate approach that engages a <u>diverse</u> constituency in stating its shared values, needs and goals
- A <u>continuum</u> including outcomes that are as diverse as our communities
- Dependent on a rich understanding of people, place and history and the <u>relationships</u> between these
- Forward-looking, enhancing a community's capacity to be healthy and sustainable
- Serving the community and the land trust, making both stronger and more <u>resilient</u>



DRA Stats



- 950+ Member Households
- Conserving land in 8 towns (serving far more)
- \$380,000 annual operating budget
- 5 regular staff members (total 4.4 FTE)
 - Executive Director
 - Operations and Program Manager
 - Director of Education & Environmental Monitoring
 - Lands and Stewardship Director
 - Communications Coordinator 40%
- Seasonal staff (counselors) and contractors



DRA Lands Protection

- Coastal, islands, historic, corridors, farms
- 5 focus areas
- 3,000+ acres protected
 - -1,400 by CE/CR
 - 900 owned (inc. 5 islands)
 - 700 pre-acquired, managed acquisition for partner, and/or provide co-management/steward
- Coastal lands \$20-200k/acre, forest \$1k/acre

Problems/Needs in Community

- Disconnect with nature kids and adults
- Excessive screen time
- Lack of exercise
- Food insecurity
- New state curriculum goals
 - STEM, Native American culture
- Limited childcare opportunities
- Desire for connection, participation
- Shortage of well-paying jobs

Problems/Needs in Organization

- Aging membership base
- Lack of fresh stories
- Pushback on tax exemption, tenuous state \$



- Engage younger demographic
- More political support, volunteers, funding
- Broaden community connection and support
- More conservation
- Lasting support = permanence
- Get kids and adults outside
